This show has been 3 years in the making, a kernel of an idea that started from my obsession over the #freebritney movement. But, my curiosity was much bigger than Britney, bigger than one celebrity, and much more about our collective desire for fame, for recognition, for love.

In 2019, I workshopped ideas with the dancers, most of whom are still in this process! Our goal was to finish creating the work in 2020 and perform it in June of that year.

And that was for the better – more time to develop and enrich the idea, bringing in more voices and talents to this beast.
